**Faculty Lounge has also undergone some reorganization**--Barish Ali, Maureen Lougen, Lorna Perez and Lisa Berglund spent a humid morning relocating chairs, tables, file cabinets, and Bobby Burns. (Painting and re-carpeting of the faculty lounge and main office is scheduled for January.)





Two student employees have joined the department: **Margaret Weiser** will be working in the main office, and **Chelsea Nabozny** will be the English Education Graduate Assistant.

In July, **Barish Ali and Heidi Wallace** directed a month-long study abroad program in Istanbul, Turkey. Ten Buffalo State students, including seven English majors, combined a rigorous academic study of the region's literature and history with a culturally immersive experience of Turkish culture. Classroom instruction, which was held at the historic <u>Boğaziçi</u>

University, was followed by visits to mosques, churches, museums, ancient Greek ruins, and other great monuments of the Classical Greek, Byzantine, and Ottoman eras; students attended Ramadan festivities, a soccer game, a whirling dervish ceremony, and a Turkish jazz concert; they learned how to order food and drinks in Turkish and how to haggle with aggressive shopkeepers in the Grand Bazaar; they were invited to the home of a Turkish family for lunch and attended guest lectures by *Boğaziçi* 



University scholars who were closely involved with Occupy Gezi Park movement; they swam in the Aegean sea, ate Turkish Delight, and drank so much tea that they stayed up some nights to watch the sunrise over the Bosporus; and, of course, they read books by Orhan Pamuk, Elif Shafak, Nazim Hikmet, and also visited Pamuk's <u>Museum of Innocence</u> – an actual museum that he conceived together with the novel. Geoff Schutte (a classroom teacher at Tapestry Charter School and co-founder of <u>Educators for a Better Buffalo</u>) spoke on "Teachers Being Agents of Change," a topic that will also serve as WNYNET's theme for 2013-2014.

**Tom Reigstad** presented his paper "John Harrison Mills: Twain's Illustrator at the *Buffalo Express*" at the <u>Seventh International Conference on the State of Mark Twain Studies</u>, held at Elmira College August 1–3. His presentation described the personal and professional relationship between Twain and Mills, the staff illustrator at the *Buffalo Express* who provided six wood-cut engraved drawings to accompany four of Twain's Saturday feature stories in August and September of 1869.

On May 22-25, **Lisa Berglund** attended the biennial meeting of the Dictionary Society of North America at the University of Georgia, a meeting that marked the end of her second term as executive secretary. She was honored for her six years of service at the conference banquet, where she also performed with the DSNA's vocal group The Catchwords. In June, she attended the MLA's Association of Departments of English meeting in Pittsburgh, and in July drove a van full of two



dogs, one suitcase, and 38 boxes (all carefully packed, with DSNA painted clearly on each) to Jersey City, the DSNA's new home. The highlight of the summer was a week at Cape Cod, which yielded this photograph, taken at Duck Harbor in Wellfleet.

of learning software. I was highly impressed at how strongly integrated the technology is at this school. The English Program / Foreign Language departments include teachers from the US, UK, The Philippines, South Korea, South Africa, Japan, France, and India."

**Thomas Poehnelt** (class of 2009) is starting his second year as a doctoral student at UMass Amherst, with a focus on Asian American graphic novels, literature and culture. His overall thesis is Fanonian, in that Asian American cultural practices are weaponized, subverting or inverting orientalist tropes to push back on the western, culturally "white" hegemonies that institute the racist ideals of yellow peril and model minoritism, which are two sides of the same coin. His wife Mary was featured on the last season of *Hell's Kitchen* and came in second place in the overall contest. Mary, after her *HK* experience, is now starting a job at Ming Tsai's flagship restaurant, Blue Ginger. She also maintains a blog <u>www.bulgogiandbutter.com</u>, and will have online videos up soon on <u>allfood.com</u>.

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

**Heidi Dietz-Faletti** read a paper at the 11<sup>th</sup> International Conference on New Directions in the Humanities on June 19 in Budapest, for the section "Mixed Media: Visual Arts, Literature and Film." The paper is entitled "Referencing the Novelistic Process in Mikhalkov's Filming of Goncharov's *Oblomov*."


#### David Gorlewski MS '74 writes:

"I think the Department would be interested – and take some pride – in knowing that my wife **Julie Gorlewski BS '75** (the former Julie Heisler) and I are the co-editors of NCTE's *English Journal.* We were appointed to a five-year term beginning in 2012 and our first issue as co-editors was published this past September. The peer-reviewed *English Journal* is published six times per year, has a circulation of just under 30,000, and an acceptance rate of



17%. Our first issue focused on Assessment and Evaluation. Future issues will center on Democracy and Education, Literature and Literacy, and Interdisciplinary Teaching.

Julie earned a Ph.D. in the Social Foundations of Education from the University at Buffalo. She is currently in her fourth year of teaching in the Education Department at SUNY New Paltz where she earned the Provost Award as the "Outstanding Non-Tenured Faculty Member" for 2013. She has served as Chair of the College's Technology Committee and is an active member of numerous committees. Prior to her appointment at New Paltz, Julie taught at Medaille College and Maryvale High School (Cheektowaga, NY) where she served as English Department Chairman, Technology Coordinator, Director of the Academic Learning Center, and founder of the school district's English as a Second Language Program. Julie's dissertation



("Inscribing Class: Writing Instruction in a Suburban, White, Working Class High School") was published under the title *Power*, *Resistance and Literacy: Writing for Social Justice.* The book received the Critics' Choice Award from the American Educational Studies Association in 2011. I don't want to get into "resume writing" here but, if you Google "Julie Gorlewski," you'll see the array of publications she has written and edited, as well as her level of activism as an advocate for public education.

I am currently an assistant professor and Director of the ral Program at D'Youville College, Prior to that, I taught for nine

Educational Leadership Doctoral Program at D'Youville College. Prior to that, I taught for nine years in the College's Education Department and, on two occasions, served as Department Chair. I received my school administrators' certification in 1985 and my Doctor of Education Degree in 2000 – both from the University at Buffalo. Before entering higher education, I served as an assistant superintendent for curriculum (at Sweet Home CSD and Maryvale UFSD); and assistant superintendent for personnel (Orchard Park CSD). These positions followed appointments as Writing Coordinator, and English Language Arts teacher in the West Seneca Central School District. I have co-authored and co-edited several books (*Theory into Practice: Case Stories for School Leaders*; and *Making it Real: Case Stories for Secondary Teachers*). Julie and I, along with a colleague from Lewis University, also contributed to, and edited, *Using Standards and High-Stakes Testing for Students: Exploiting Power with Critical Pedagogy* – which won the Critics' Choice Award from AESA in 2012.

We both have fond memories of our time at Buffalo State College and we often talk about certain professors' methods or philosophies which ended up having a major impact on our own teaching of language arts. Thank you for inviting this update!"

#### Matt Gryta BA '69 writes:

"After being editor of the *Record* my sophomore and senior years and capturing a lot of awards for at St. Bonaventure contest for my senior year editing and graduating with a fine English degree, I ended up never working for a living. Have been a journalist professionally since mid-1969, including a free one-year trip to Vietnam where I finally ended up an Army uniformed War Correspondent in charge of the reporters and photographers for the American Division as a hard-strip Sgt. Was sent to the war as a radio operator and ended up in charge of the commo unit on a Batallion fire base in the boonies. Tried to get into Army journalism school since I worked as a *Buffalo News* police reporter before entering Army as a draftee. They did not want me there, but took Al Gore instead....



My first book, *The Real Teflon Don* about the State Police unit that secretly taped Stefano Magadinno's top brass, was published over a year ago. I have a second book that should be published in the next six to eight months and am completing a review of the manuscript of a third. I have two others I am trying to get published. 
## No Comment Department...

The four-week study tour, which will take place from June 24 to July 20, will be hosted by Boğaziçi University. Barish and **Heidi Wallace** will co-teach two courses in Istanbul: "Modern Turkish Literature" and the



"Cultural History of Istanbul." Previous recipients of this competitive grant include Yale, Syracuse, and George Washington universities.
