More proof that Professors do not take the summer off! The English Department Faculty were exceptionally busy this summer, both in terms of planning for the upcoming academic year, and in pursuing their own scholarly and creative projects. Look at all the work we've done in our "time off":

In June, DR. BARISH ALI presented on "Travel Narratives in Dialogue: Contesting Representations of Post-Ottoman Cyprus" at the Ottoman Cosmopolitanism

Research Network's international conference at Birkbeck College, University of London.



In July, DR. ALI also led the department's Summer in Istanbul (http://english.buffalostate.edu/turkey) study abroad program. Eleven Buffalo State students read works by contemporary Turkish authors, learned about Turkish and Islamic art, and visited the ancient city of Ephesus. Heidi Wallace, who is currently pursuing her PhD at the University of Arizona, co-directed the program.

DR. JAMES CERCONE along with David Bruce, Assistant Professor of English Education at the University at Buffalo, recently published "Media Literacy Principles and the Common Core State Standards in English Language Arts Teacher Education" in *The Next Digital Scholar: A Fresh Approach to the Common Core State Standards in Research and Writing (Purdy, J.P. & McClure, R., 2014).* The chapter contextualizes the Common Core State Standards within theoretical fields of Media Studies, New Literacies Studies, and Critical Literacy and provides classroom examples of how English teachers and English teacher educators can address the new standards while engaging in meaningful teaching and learning with their students.

(http://www.noonannual.com/), and her flash fiction "Bird" was published in the July issue of NEW FLASH FICTION REVIEW (http://newflashfiction.com/kim-chinquee/). She was interviewed for NPR's SNAP JUDGEMENT

(http://snapjudgment.org/) for an upcoming podcast, and interviewed by Trevor Dodge, to be showcased in a future airing of his podcast POSSIBLE ARCHITECT (http://possiblearchitect.wordpress.com/about/). She was also featured in 1300 Elmwood (http://english.buffalostate.edu/news/athletic-english-professormasters-lean-prose). Prof. Chinquee's AWP (Association of Writers and Writing Programs) Panel Proposal "The Flash Fiction Marketplace: What Editors are Looking For" was accepted, and she will present (along with writers/editors Lex Williford, Tom Hazuka, and Meg Tuite) in Minneapolis at the AWP conference on April 10, 2015

(https://www.awpwriter.org/awp_conference/proposal_submissions_acceptances). In August, she competed in the USA Triathlon Age Group National Championships in Milwaukee, WI (http://www.usatriathlon.org/events/usat/2014/08/olympic-distance-national-championships.aspx).

DR. ANN C. COLLEY, SUNY Distinguished Professor, is currently a Visiting Scholar at Wolfson College, Cambridge University (UK). While she is there from October 1 until January 21st (2015), she will be starting a new project based upon the travel writing she has done for over twenty years. Over the past twenty or so years, Dr. Colley has spent a year each in Poland and Ukraine as a Fulbright scholar. She has also spent considerable time in such places as Easter Island, Senegal, Cape Verde, South Africa, Botswana, Zimbabwe, Ecuador, Chili, Bolivia, Argentina, Brazil, Panama, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Belize, the Orkney Islands, the USSR, Finland, The Czech Republic, Belarus, Latvia, Armenia, Morocco, Turkey, and the San Blas Islands. Dr. Colley's models for this project are books written by W. G. Sebald (*Rings of Saturn, The Emigrants, Austerlitz*), by Robert MacFarlane (*Mountains of the Mind, The Old Ways*), as well as the travel writing of Patrick Leigh Fermor.

Dr. Colley goes to Cambridge having just finished proofing the page proofs for a new book *Wild Animal Skins in Victorian Britain: Zoos, Collections, Portraits, and Maps*, to be published by Ashgate in November, 2014. While she is at the University of Cambridge, Dr. Colley will be giving two talks: One to the Cambridge English Faculty ("Wild Skins and Mapping the Victorian Landscape") and one to the Fellows of Wolfson College ("Empire and Industry at the Belle Vue Zoo, Manchester"). She will also be returning, briefly, to attend and give a paper ("A Skin Disorder") at the North American Victorian Studies Association, this year held in London, Ontario. While she is away, an article on performances of Oscar Wilde's society plays, "Conversations with Oscar Wilde," will be appearing in *Victorian Literature and Culture* (Cambridge UP), V. 43.1.

DR. HEIDI DIETZ FALETTI read a paper on June 12, at the 12th International Conference on New Directions in the Humanities at the Universidad San Pablo CEU in Madrid. The paper is entitled "Cinematic Transformations of Desire and Dissolution in Robbe-Grillet's Film 'L'Immortelle'" for the section "Psychoanalytic Studies."


DR. PETER RAMOS was in residence at two artist colonies this summer, the Marble House Project in Vermont (in June) and the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts (VCCA) (in August). Peter published an introduction to poet Rosa Alcalá's poetry in *Angels of the Americlypse* (Counterpath 2014). He also recently published two poems, "Isla" in *The Cincinnati Review* 11.1 (2014) and "Harvest" in *Slipstream*, 34.1 (2014). Peter will be reading for the *Slipstream* release party this Saturday, Sept. 27th, at 6 pm at The Book Corner, 1801 Main St., Niagara Falls, NY 14305. Ed Taylor will also be reading, along with others from the issue.

DR. JENNIFER RYAN'S proposed roundtable, co-authored with UNC-Charlotte's Malin Pereira, has been accepted for presentation at the 2015 MLA convention in Vancouver. This panel, "Remembering--and Not Forgetting--Wanda Coleman," will memorialize the late LA poet's life as well as energizing new critical conversations about her work. Panelists also include Shanna Benjamin of Grinnell College and Austin Straus, Coleman's husband of 33 years, who will discuss his literary and personal collaborations with her. 
PRESIDENTIAL INAUGURATION




Julie and David Gorlewski, English

FACULTY NEWS



DR. JAMES CERCONE has published **Communities of** Practice: Bridging the Gap Between Methods Courses and **Secondary Schools** in Reclaiming English Language Arts Methods Courses: Critical Issues and Challenges for Teacher Educators in Top Down Times (Brass, J & Webb, A. Eds. Routledge, 2014). The chapter focuses on how theoretical frameworks of situated learning, peripheral participation



(Lave and Wenger, 1991), learning within communities of practice (Wenger, 1998) and James Gee's notions of affinity spaces (2009) can be used to re-conceptualize English teacher education and position teacher education programs as regional hubs for teaching and learning in the English Language Arts. Dr. Cercone's chapter draws on research he has conducted on the Western New York Network of English Teachers and the English language arts methods courses he has taught.

From the book: Reclaiming English Language Arts Methods Courses showcases innovative work in teacher education that fosters teachers' capacities as reflective practitioners and public intellectuals; extends traditional boundaries of methods courses on teaching the English language arts, literacy, children's and young adult literature; and embodies democratic and critical politics that go beyond the reductive economic aims and traditional classroom practices sanctioned by educational policies and corporate educational reforms.

Featuring leading and emerging scholars in English language arts teacher education, each chapter provides rich and concrete examples of elementary and secondary methods courses rooted in contemporary research and theory, on-line resources, and honest appraisals of the possibilities, tensions, and limits of doing teacher education differently in a top-down time of standards-based education, high-stakes testing, teacher assessment, and neoliberal education reforms. This book offers important resources and support for teacher educators and graduate students to explore alternative visions for aligning university methods courses with current trends in English and cultural studies, critical sociocultural literacy, new literacies and web 2.0 tools, and teaching the English language arts in multiethnic, multilingual, and underserved urban communities.





Book Orders: You should have submitted your spring book orders by now. You can do this online using the Faculty Enlight system on the bookstore's website.



SCHOLARSHIPS

The English Department is pleased to announce that we will be offering a new scholarship for our students. The Shine Scholarship has been generously funded by the Riverrun Foundation, and honors the work and example of Laurence Shine. We will begin taking applications for the award immediately. The recipient will engage in a year long research project of their choosing, directed by Laurence, with a focus on Irish or Irish American literature, culture, history, performance etc. More details will be sent out to the department shortly.

FACULTY NEWS

DR. BARISH ALI and HEIDI WALLACE'S (MA alum) article "Out of this World: Ziggy Stardust and the Spatial Interplay of Lyrics, Vocals, and Performance" has been published in David Bowie: Critical Perspectives (Routledge) edited by Eoin Devereux, Aileen Dillane, and Martin Power. Their chapter examines the words and images of David Bowie from the perspective of literary and postmodern theories. The working hypothesis of their chapter is Roland Barthes's claim that the "grain" of the singing voice – the materiality of the singing body – exceeds traditional modes of linguistic signification because it adds a bodily layer to the singer's words through a reinscription of the voice onto the body. The chapter argues that Bowie has radically problematised our preconceptions of identity and materiality in vocal music by allowing his listeners to enjoy his voice – in both its granular and affective qualities – without having to identify it with a single, unchanging persona.

Also, The Turkish Coalition of America has awarded DR. ALI a \$5,000 Study in Turkey grant to continue running his Summer in Istanbul program. Over the past three years, Barish's program has received a total of more than \$31,000 in direct aid to students from SUNY Global, the Turkish Coalition of America, and the "We'll Get You There" Student International Travel Award Program.

DR. ANN COLLEY has recently been asked to join the Editorial Board of a new collection of volumes, directed by Francesco Marroni, Professor of English Literature at the University of Chieti-Pescara, Italy. This collection, called "Crossways," was successfully opened a few years ago under the name of "Rasselas." Other members of the board are: Phillip Mallet (St. Andrews University), John Paul Rosso (University of Miami), Andrew Stauffer (University of Virginia), and Norman Etherington (University of Western Australia).

Additionally, DR. COLLEY'S 8,000-word entry on Robert Louis Stevenson has just appeared in the newly published four-volume *The Encyclopedia of Victorian Literature* edited by Dino Franco Felluga, Pamela K. Gilbert, and Linda K. Hughes. Wiley Blackwell is the publisher. The encyclopedia will also be available online: www.literatureencyclopedia.com






