

In July, BARISH ALI directed the department's month-long **Summer in Istanbul** study abroad program. Five students from the English Department – Susan Blake, Kamesha Brinson, Garrett Busshart, Michelle Kuebler, and Paige Ronan – combined



a rigorous academic study of the region's literature and history with a culturally immersive experience of Turkish culture. Classroom instruction, which was held at the historic Boğaziçi University, was followed by visits to mosques, churches, museums, ancient Greek ruins, and other great monuments of the Classical Greek,

Byzantine, and Ottoman eras; students attended Ramadan festivities and a Turkish jazz

concert; they learned how to order food and drinks in Turkish and how to haggle with aggressive shopkeepers in the Grand Bazaar (where students



bought scarves, lamps, and Turkish rugs); they were invited to the home of a



Turkish family for dinner and attended guest lectures by local professors; they swam in the Aegean sea, petted a farmer's camel, ate Turkish Delight, petted all the Istanbul street cats, and drank gallons of tea. And, of course, they read books by Orhan Pamuk, Elif Shafak, and Nazim Hikmet, and they visited Pamuk's Museum of Innocence – an actual museum that he conceived together with the novel of the same name. In addition to their formal assignments, students

were required to record their experiences in private diaries and at this blog: <u>https://istanbulmemoirs.wordpress.com/</u>.





Some interesting statistics about e-books and the durability of print: *The New York Times* reports that "E-book sales fell by 10 percent in the first five months of this year, according to the Association of American Publishers, which collects data from nearly 1,200 publishers. Digital books accounted last year for around 20 percent of the market, roughly the same as they did a few years ago." Meanwhile, confirming the heartening evidence that printed

books continue to find readers, the American Booksellers Association counted 1,712 member stores in 2,227 locations in 2015, up from 1,410 in 1,660 locations five years ago. 




The second edition of Aimable's book *Historical Dictionary of Rwanda* was published by Rowman & Littlefield on November 6. It is a mini-encyclopedia of


