The English office has moved to 213 Ketchum Hall; the Chair's office is across the hall in 209.

CHARLES BACHMAN has published a book, *Sketches of the Human Comedy*. In its Preface, he writes, "A few years ago I was sitting in the English Department faculty lounge at Buffalo



State College, killing time waiting for the late afternoon traffic to clear. I went to the art sketch program on my cell phone, did a small sketch, and texted it to my wife with the comment, 'Now you see why I never went to art school.' Almost immediately she texted me back with, 'What do you mean? That looks pretty good to me.'" He has gone on to create over four hundred sketches; over one hundred of these digital creations appear in the book.

An article by JAMES CERCONE, "Standing at the Crossroads: Content Creation in the 21st-Century English Classroom," appears in the January 2017 issue of *English Journal*, and details how English classrooms might be reconceptualized as content creation sites where digital video composing enhances workshop approaches to English instruction.

THERESA DESMOND will be presenting a paper "Kate Chopin's Mademoiselle Reisz: Secondary Character, Primary Role" at the 48th annual NeMLA conference in Baltimore this spring. The session is entitled, "Overlooked, Forgotten or Maligned: Bringing Minor Characters into Focus," and will be held on Friday, March 24th 3:00 p.m. It is a chapter on her doctoral dissertation which she hopes to defend later this year.



He was a medic in the U.S. Army for two years, and went on to get a Doctor of Arts in English at SUNY Albany. His doctoral dissertation was "The Embodiment of Religious Meaning in the Works of James Baldwin." By 1990 he decided to answer Baldwin's call and gained an MSW at SUNY Buffalo and worked in the African-American community of Buffalo around William and Jefferson Streets for many years. He's very excited that a biopic of James Baldwin's writings, "I am not Your Negro," was nominated for the Academy Award for best documentary. "Buffalo State is still the college closest to my heart!"

TIM DELANEY earned his B.Ss in English Education in 2002 and his M.S.Ed. in 2009 from Buffalo State. He's been a teacher at South Park High School for the past 15 years and Head Football Coach for the past 9 years. He was named the Buffalo Bills and Buffalo News Coach of the Year, and South Buffalo Chamber of Commerce Educator of the Year in 2015.

CHRISTOPHER STAMPONE majored in English literature and earned his B.A. from Buffalo State in 2007. He recently defended his dissertation at Southern Methodist University, where he wrote on romance and Romanticism in a transatlantic context. His work has appeared in such journals as Early American Literature, African American Review, Nathaniel Hawthorne Review, Keats-Shelley Review, Studies in American Naturalism, and The Explicator. He was recently inducted into Phi Beta Kappa for his graduate work and is the first graduate student representative to SMU's Board of Trustees. "I can say, without a modicum of exaggeration, that I would not have achieved anything if not for the excellent, caring teachers I had at Buffalo State. ...I am grateful for my time at Buffalo State and will always consider it my primary home."


DEPARTMENT AND FACULTY NEWS

ANN COLLEY reports from Cambridge, "I am finding the resources of the Cambridge University Library to be incredibly rich. Everything I need is at my fingertips. My research on Samuel Taylor Coleridge's descriptions of landscape and his topographical line drawings is taking me in all sorts of interesting directions. Most recently my attention has drifted to theories and history of cartography. For the last week I have been looking at late-eighteenth-century engraved maps of the Lake District and Wales. In the last month, essays I wrote for books published by Palgrave and by Routledge have appeared. One on Stevenson, "Twaddle and Lies:

Letters in Stevenson's Later Fiction," and another "Collecting the Live and the Skinned" in *Animals in Victorian Britain*. Spring in Cambridge is glorious. When I walk to the University Library, I amble along streets covered in white blossoms that have fallen from the fruit trees that line the road."

This past January, ANGELA FULK chaired a session about academic advising at the MLA convention in Philadelphia. Her talk, entitled "Tea and Sympathy: Unofficial Advising of Students" was later published in the February 28 edition of *Inside Higher Ed*. More recently, she chaired a roundtable on academic bias at the NeMLA convention in Baltimore in March, where she spoke on the topic of "Academic Biases about Adjunct Faculty." She continues to serve as the NeMLA Area Chair for Professional Development and Pedagogy.
