<u>Thundersnow</u>, JOEY NICOLETTI's latest poetry collection, was released by Grandma Moses Press in June. "Silo City," one of *Thundersnow's* poems, was selected for inclusion in the anthology *Beauty First*. JOEY also has personal essays forthcoming in the next issue of *ELJ* and in the inaugural edition of *Ovunque Siamo: Italian-American Writing*.

LISA BERGLUND's research into objects left in 19th century dictionaries, which she presented at the 2017 Dictionary Society of North America meeting in June, earned a mention in the *Chronicle of Higher Education's* "Lingua Franca" blog. TOM REIGSTAD was an invited panelist at the Association for Documentary Editing's 2017 annual conference, held June 22-24 in Buffalo. His presentation was on "The Tale of the Lost Huckleberry Finn Manuscript" as part of a special session "Scholarly Editors and the Law." TOM also presented his paper "Mark Twain and the Coal Question" at the Eighth International Conference on the State of Mark Twain Studies, hosted by the Center for Mark Twain Studies at Elmira College, August 3-5; and finally, he served on the New York State Education Department's Range-finding Committee for the Regents Exam in English Language Arts (ELA) which met in Albany August 6-10. Composed of English educators from across the state, the committee reviewed student responses and scoring materials (tasks and reading passages) from select field-tested ELA Regents Exams to be used in scoring guides.

KAREN SANDS-O'CONNOR'S book, *Children's Publishing and Black Britain 1965-2015*, was published in July, just in time for her to take it to the International Research Society for Children's Literature conference in Toronto. Prior to that, she spent seven weeks in the UK: five of them learning techniques of digital archiving at the V&A, the National Archives, and the National Centre for the Children's Book at Newcastle University; and two more guiding


STUDENT AND ALUMNI NEWS


application process includes an essay on life goals, writing samples, and a letter of endorsement from a faculty member.

The Dellas Scholarship supports a full-time junior or senior majoring in biology, chemistry, design, earth sciences, economics, **English**, French language and literature, mathematics, photography, physics, or psychology who has a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.5. Applicants must submit two letters of recommendation, one from a Buffalo State faculty or staff member, the other from a personal reference who can discuss the applicant's academic status and

achievements, personal attributes, potential for success, and aspirations to make an impact in a substantive area. This scholarship is renewable for up to two years, provided recipients maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.5. Funds are disbursed in the fall semester only. The amount of the 2018 scholarship is \$2,492.30.



Is indeterminancy responsible for this new world of "post-fact" or "post-truth"? Is poststructuralist decentering somehow complicit in the rise of "alternative facts" of recent newspeak, or does it offer a critical bulwark against it?

On Friday at 7 pm, PETER RAMOS will be reading at the issue launch of the literary journal *Mutata Re*, at the ECC City Campus Auditorium at 121 Ellicott Street.





Here's the press's blurb: *Figures of Time* proposes radically new ideas about the very poetic ground of culture. Presenting unique close readings of six modern poets—Wallace Stevens, W. B. Yeats, H. D. (Hilda Doolittle), Ezra Pound, Langston Hughes, and T. S.

Eliot—David Ben-Merre brings recent theoretical questions about the rhetoric of modernism and poetic figuration into current discussions in critical theory. He argues that poetic spaces, often disjunctions of sound and sense, disrupt our culturally inherited notions of time, reimagining with an often irrational and anachronistic backward glance what we take to be historical chronologies, psychological perceptions of time, and collective scripts about causality.
