OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS

The **Undergraduate Research Small Grant Awards program** is continuing, although only non-travel expenses can be funded until further notice. This program provides up to \$400 to assist students in carrying out their research and creative activities. The award may be used to help defray the cost of materials required to conduct the project. It is not intended as salary for the student. **Deadlines for submitting applications for the fall round of**

awards are October 14 for the student and October 16 for the faculty mentor.

Other programs from the Undergraduate Research Office will continue, including the <u>Undergraduate Travel Program</u>, which invites applications in support of student presentations at virtual disciplinary conferences. Fall 2020 <u>EURO</u> Micro-Projects provide \$500 stipends to lower-division students for participating in faculty research and creative activities. (Applications close on October 26.) Digital projects are encouraged and faculty mentors and students may search the <u>Digital SRCC</u>

FACULTY NEWS

The Capella-Bard School of Education Scholarship for Applied Literacy Fund has been fully endowed, thanks to the generosity of Betty Capella and GERALDINE BARD. The fund supports an annual scholarship for a student whose major includes the promotion of applied literacy (including English Education). Details of the application and award process will be forthcoming from the Financial Aid office.

On July 24, MAGGIE HERB and some Writing Center tutors attended a virtual conference hosted by the Mid-Atlantic Writing Centers Association on Anti-Racist Writing Center Pedagogy, the aim of which was to "assist administrators in developing tutor training and tutors in negotiating conversations about antiracism as it arises within tutoring sessions." The participants will be doing a professional development session on what they learned for the entire Writing Center staff later this fall. Among the tutors who attended the conference were peer tutor ARIEL NEITCH (Writing major) and professional tutor and CWP faculty member CHERYL WEAVER-AMENTA.

MAGGIE also was invited to give a virtual lecture for West Virginia State University's writing center tutors-in-training on online tutoring pedagogy and the impact of Covid-19 on writing center practices.

The English Department will be partnering with other departments to support new certificates and degrees. These proposed programs, **Theater Directing for Teachers** and the **BFA in Art and Design with Concentration in Design History**, will include at least one English course as a requirement or an elective.

Late last year, Buffalo State officially became the home of the **Western New York Writing Project**, thanks to generous contributions from the Schools of Education and Arts and Humanities. Their philanthropic support continues in 20221 as we look to building a new and thriving program.

The National



Writing Project, funded by the US Department of Education, supports a network of over 200 local sites, including the Western New York Writing Project (WNYWP), The WNYWP, led by KATHIE MACRO, MAGGIE HERB, and HILARY LOCHTE, provides online and face-to-face professional development in the teaching of writing for P-12 teachers across the Western New York area, creating a strong local network of teacher-leaders who can then share their expertise with their peers.

The WNYWP hopes to assume a central, visible role in creating partnerships with local schools and community organizations, applied learning experiences for teachers and teacher candidates, and other opportunities for community engagement. The WNYWP's first workshop in fall 2020 focused on helping teachers navigate the teaching of writing in online environments, introducing them to best practices and new technologies to help them give effective feedback. It connects us to the local community through the professional development we can provide to teachers and students alike; and it will be an effective platform to reach teachers at all levels. The WNYWP also has the potential to

connect our campus with other Writing Project sites across the country and generate positive national press about the work we do here at Buffalo State College.

The Undergraduate Research <u>Small Grants Program</u> provides up to \$400 to assist undergraduate students in carrying out a research, scholarly, or

creative activity during the academic year (up to \$600 may be requested for a single project that involves two or more students). Funding is intended to help defray the cost of supplies and other materials necessary to conduct the project and is currently limited to non-travel expenses. Award recipients will be required to participate virtually in the <u>23rd</u> <u>annual Buffalo State Student Research and Creativity Conference</u> (Digital SRCC 2021), to be held asynchronously in May. The spring application deadline for submission of the student portion is Wednesday, February 24; faculty mentor approval is due by Friday, February 26. For more details, please visit the online application portal on the <u>Undergraduate Research</u> <u>website</u>.

The University of Michigan's Ready for Rackham program (<u>R4R</u>) is now accepting applications for July 2021. The one-month residential program at the University of Michigan is designed to support undergraduate students' preparation for doctoral study.. The program is designed to support students earlier in their undergraduate careers; rising sophomores and students from diverse backgrounds are encouraged to apply. The program covers all expenses and includes a \$2,000 stipend. Dates, eligibility requirements, contact information, and more program details are on the Ready for Rackham <u>website</u>. (NB the program is planned to be in-person but may go online if conditions warrant.)


